

## **Keeping Safe**

Yesterday we sent home some useful guidance from the NHS about what to do if your child or a member of your household has symptoms or tests positive for COVID-19. We hope you found this informative and we ask that you follow this advice in order to keep our children and staff safe. In particular, please note the section about anyone in the household who has symptoms, stating that **everyone in that household must isolate as soon as the symptoms start** until either a negative test result is received or for 14 days if the test is positive (10 days for the person who tested positive).

It is also extremely important that everyone entering the school site follows the one-way system we have put in place. If all parents do this, it will ensure nobody has to pass on the narrow path leading from the entrance gate where it is impossible to keep 2m apart. A text was sent out this week requesting that the one-way system is followed by all and failure to do this will result in a ban from the school site as it puts the safety of our school community at risk.
